A citation for outstanding achievement was awarded to the Western New York Chapter of the AHS at the Nineteenth National Conference in Winston-Salem, NC, in June. In presenting the award to Margaret Semski, chapter president, Patricia Wooster acknowledged the activities and achievements of the chapter in addition to the dedication and creativity of its members.

The chapter holds monthly harp classes which include performance, critiquing, videotaping, guest speakers and performers. They recently sponsored a workshop by Mildred Dilling and also hold periodic harp maintenance sessions.

One of the most satisfying achievements of the chapter has been to sponsor the 1980 national AHS Conference in Fredonia. Mario Falcao was Conference Chairman for this event.

Under the leadership of Pauline Breneman and Nancy Hulsen, the chapter cooperated with the Orchard Park Music Boosters to raise funds for the purchase of a concert pedal harp for the school district. Each member of the chapter was involved with every aspect of the fund-raising effort which included a "Play it Again" musical flea market and a benefit concert with members and guest artists performing. Joining three troubadour harps already in the schools, the pedal harp arrived in the spring of 1982, and has been used by the Orchard Park Harp Ensemble in their school and on tours throughout New York and Pennsylvania. This pedal harp project was launched by Vivian Tomb.

A program of harp lessons for adults and children and an accompanying curriculum was also developed by the chapter. They have expanded the repertoire for harp ensemble by commissioning new works by Loren Geiger. These ensemble pieces have been performed with the Orchard Park Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Dr. Joseph Wincenc.

In addition to Margaret Semski, president, current chapter officers include Elizabeth Baker, vice-president; Patricia Ruof, secretary; and Rebecca Squire, treasurer. The chapter was nominated for this award by the New York Regional Director, Ruth Papalia. Other AHS chapters may be recommended to the AHS Executive Committee for outstanding achievements through Regional Directors.

Later that day Susann McDonald coordinated a program of "Homage to Great Harpists," honoring Rosa Balcells (Spain), Phia Berghout (Neth.), Vera Dulova (USSR), Ursula Lentrodt (FRG), and Dora Wagner (FRG). That same evening, a two-part concert proved very popular with the attendees. The first part was a duo harp recital by Vera Dulova and Tatanya Tauer of the USSR. Their presentation was followed by a contrasting program of "The Harp in Pop/Jazz." Performers included Naoko Kubo (Japan), Stella Castellucci (USA), Alfredo Rolando Ortiz (Paraguay/USA), Harvi Griffin (USA), and Master of Ceremonies Eleanor Fell (USA).

"Young Harpists of Austria" and "Harpists of Austria" were featured in separate concerts on the sixth day, as were a charming group of Tyrolean musicians, singers and harpists. The last day included four concerts, scheduled to begin at one hour intervals at various locations throughout Vienna!

Throughout the week the Exhibitors were incorporated as a vital part of the Congress, beginning with a formal opening ceremony in the exhibition area of the Palais Auersperg, complete with music by two Austrian harp ensembles. 1988 Eastern Pop Harp Seminar

The 1988 Eastern Pop Harp Seminar was held 7–12 August at the Boston Conservatory of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. The event, sponsored by Lyon & Healy Harps and The Gilded Harps of Boston, was the third festival specializing in pop and jazz harp held on the East Coast. Directed by Felice Pomeranz, the seminar offered classes in theory, jazz harmony and arranging, recording, self-promotion, master classes in jazz performance, an electronic harp demonstration, and performance with a group. Featured artists included Stella Castellucci, Eleanor Fell, Deborah Henson-Conant, Carrol McLaughlin, Jack Nebergall (who brought his entire group, The Danny Yale Regency Strings), and special guest artist Robert Maxwell. Cynthia Price-Glynn, who is Professor of Harp at the Boston Conservatory, presented a workshop on Latin rhythms and also performed with her group Andanzas, Songs of South America. Lyon & Healy harp technician Peter Wiley gave an informative seminar on harp maintenance and repair.

Each artist was featured in concert in the evenings, and the Seminar was privileged to hear Robert Maxwell present an entire recital entitled "A Potpourri of Pop-

ular Music through the Centuries."

A highlight of the week was the 1988 Eastern Pop Harp Competition, with prize money totaling \$2000 donated by Lyon & Healy Harps. The winners were Jan Jennings, first place; Susan Brown, second place; and tied for third place were Carolyn Sykes and Caryn Wunderlich Gott. The four winners were presented in concert at the final gala dinner. Judges for the competition included the artists-in-residence as well as the composer of the "mystery tune," Matthew Marvulgio. Mr. Marvulgio is chairman of the woodwind department at the Berklee School of Music.

Despite the intense heat and humidity throughout the week, the participants were enthusiastic and openminded to the many new aspects of pop and jazz harp performance discussed at the Seminar. Harpists from several states, Newfoundland, Québec, and Toronto enjoyed sharing ideas and making new friends while studying this new field in harp performance: Pop and Jazz Harp!

Paraguayan Harps

We traveled to Paraguay for the adoption of our daughter, Martha. In the few weeks before we left on our trip, we researched details about Paraguay from South American travel articles and a few dated books we managed to find at the library. In these was an intriguing piece of information—that the harp was the national instrument of Paraguay.

Paraguay is a small, landlocked country in the center of South America. Its population is primarily mestizos, people of mixed Spanish and Guarani Indian ancestry. How did harps find their way to Paraguay? By the sixteenth century, harps were prominent instruments in Spain, so it was only natural that the early Spanish conquerors of Paraguay brought their harps with them. As early as 1526, harpist Martin Nino arrived in an area that borders present-day Argentina, Uruguay, and Paraguay. The Jesuits, who built a series of missions in Paraguay, also brought harps and taught the native Guarani Indians to make and play them. When the Jesuits were thrown out of the country in 1767, one partial inventory recorded that 100 harps had been found among the other musical instruments at the different missions.

The Paraguayan harp differs from its European counterpart. About half the size of the concert harp, the arpa is made of cedar, pine, and other native woods. It has 36 strings and is a diatonic instrument limited to a major key and its related minor. New innovations include pegs on the sounding board between the strings of the upper octaves. When the string is pressed against the peg by the player's finger, the half tone is produced. The more traditional Paraguayan harps achieve half tones by the player's pressing against the string on the neck with a metal tuning-key-shaped object, a much more difficult procedure. The harp is played with the fingernails, more a combination of harp and guitar techniques, which produces a bright, powerful sound that is well-suited to the native folk music and dances.

on the cover

We are indebted to the J. Paul Getty Museum in Malibu, California, for permission to use a detail of an elegant manuscript leaf on our cover. The informal title given by the Museum is "Donkey Playing a Harp;" more specifically, the leaf is from a Cistercian Antiphonal for High Feasts, made ca. 1260-70, probably from the Cistercian abbey of Cambron, near Mons, in the Diocese of Tournai. The full size of the leaf is 48×34.9 cm., and its tempera colors and colored inks were applied on vellum. The Museum waived reproduction rights fees, for which we are also grateful!

After considerable study of the leaf, I was able to determine that the text and chant (written in mature Gregorian notation) are assigned as a responsory for the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin, celebrated annually on 15 August (and thus highly suitable for our summer issue). One can see the "Ave Maria" at the top of the manuscript, followed by "Vidi speciosam sicut columbam

ascendentem" (I saw her, beautiful, ascending as a dove ...). The rising dove is clearly portrayed at the left of the manuscript, and a portrait of Mary is contained in the lovely illuminated letter "V"-but why did the unknown artist choose to include the delightful (and obviously happy) donkey playing a harp? Although scribes often took pleasure in adding fanciful illustrations around the borders of their manuscripts, I can surmise that this choice was not merely for the sake of humor. The harp symbolized to the medieval mind many things, but, in general, all music in honor of God. The presence of the humblest of the animal kingdom at the birth of Christ is suggested in the prophecy of Isaiah I:3: "the ox knoweth its owner and the ass his master's crib." Artists through the ages have regularly included these two in scenes of the Nativity, along with Mary, Joseph, the Infant Jesus, and sometimes the Annunciation to the Shepherds in the background.

It is interesting that there is a sculpture of a donkey playing a harp on the south tower of the Chartres Cathedral which dates from about the same time as our manuscript; it is called "l'âne qui vielle" (the donkey who plays the hurdy-gurdy—but in fact a harp).

The Bay Area Chapter of The American Harp Society serves predominantly San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley, and the surrounding suburban areas. In actuality, it extends to the Oregon border and includes northern Nevada and metropolitan Sacramento.

In 1991/1992 our chapter activities were expanded to include a summer newsletter and a successful teachers' workshop in August. Programming continued on a monthly basis with emphasis on the non-professional harpist and the inclusion and co-sponsorship of activities with the adjacent Santa Clara Chapter and the Bay Area Folk Harp Society. Six concerts and five workshops were held.

An intensive membership outreach and requests for student membership did not achieve significant results. Attendance at social/musical events, however, reached over 60%.

We produce a hefty newsletter every other month which everyone enjoys. It has contained problem-solving columns by Jack Nebergall, feature articles, harp concert reviews, cartoons, a Ms. Gliss page for the young set, and

the popular "War Stories"-all contributed by the membership-in addition to the calendar, Market Place, president's letter, and promotional publicity.

We added honorariums and bouquets for our assisting musicians and gifts to our workshop presenters and hostesses. Two fund-raisers increased our income to cover these expanded budget expenses plus concert space rentals, mailing costs, and the establishment of an Educational Fund.

An on-going informal ensemble was begun, open to the entire membership. Five jolly sessions by an enthusiastic group assure its continuation.

We initiated the restructuring of the Inez Stafford Scholarship Auditions and have the event scheduled for spring of 1993.

The 1991/1992 chapter year demonstrated innovation, increased and varied activities, excellent attendance, a high quality newsletter, and great enthusiasm. The Board of Directors were: Charlotte Wolter, President; Wendy Tamis, First Vice President; Jack Nebergall, Second Vice President; Mavis Cauffman, Secretary/Newsletter editor; and Claudette Lambert, Treasurer.

The San Francisco Early Music Society's Medieval Workshop

The Medieval Workshop of the San Francisco Early Music Society was held 26 July to 1 August 1992 on the Dominican College campus in San Rafael, California. The Workshop offered a choice of 29 different classes on various medieval repertoires and instruments taught by a distinguished faculty of virtuoso performers and scholars, including singers Harlan Hokin and Karen Clark Young and members of Ensemble Alcatraz (Shira Kammen, vielle; Kit Higginson, recorder and psaltery; Cheryl Ann Fulton, harp; and Peter Maund, percussion). Evening performances and lectures by faculty supplemented the classes. The harp classes taught by Cheryl Ann Fulton were focused on the principles of medieval rhetoric as they apply to music, interpretation of poetic and musical forms, improvisation and harp techniques which are appropriate to early music, and historical harps. Harpists performed in many of the workshop ensembles. Celtic, folk and lap harps were played as well as historical instruments built by Rainer Thurau, David Cortier, David Brooks, Lynn Lewandowski and Winfried Goerge and these were shared so that all the harpists had an opportunity to try them. Harpists attending the 1992 Workshop were Natalie Cox, Tynowyn French, Eileen Hadidian, Barbara Imhoff, Leonie Jenkins, John Mackay, Helen Rifas and Connie Whiteside. The harpists experienced the oral tradition of early music firsthand by learning an anonymous motet, Salve Virgo Virginem, by rote and performing it from memory on the final student recital.


Chapter of the Year: The Los Angeles Chapter

The Lyon & Healy International Jazz and Pop Harpfest

On Tuesday, 24 May 1993, the campus of Northern Illinois University in DeKalb saw the influx of 150 harpists from all over the world, coming together to share their creative insights, knowledge and the excitement of performing popular and jazz music on the harp.

The occasion was the second International Jazz and Pop Harpfest, an energy-packed five-day event sponsored by Lyon & Healy and directed by Carrol McLaughlin.

This year's festival included competitions, concerts, workshops and jam sessions for both pedal and non-pedal harps.

The prize winners in the non-pedal harp competition were: first place (\$750), Kathy Chanik from Virginia; second place (\$450), Susan Ennen from Minnesota; and third

place (\$250), Anne Krickel from Georgia. In the pedal harp competition, first place went to Magali Zsigmond from France, with an award of \$1,000; second place to Monika Stadler from Austria, winning \$600, and two third-place winners, Kim Rowe from Michigan and Cindy Horstman from Texas, received \$400 each.

The faculty included many of the most respected and innovative harpists in the pop and jazz fields. Each evening featured two "Showcase Performances" which highlighted outstanding performers from around the world, followed by evening faculty concerts. The opening night featured Showcase Performances by Alberto Sanabria performing on the Paraguayan Harp and Michael O'Shiver from Puerto Rico performing with bass and drums. The evening concert featured Carrol McLaughlin, who presented the world première of a composition by N.I.U. jazz professor Antonio Garcia (who shared the performance); and Greg Buchanan, well-known gospel harpist. Tuesday evening's concerts included performances by England's Rupert Parker playing on the Lyon & Healy electric harp, and incorporating sound tracks from his latest CD's; and the jazz duo United Sound, composed of Pegi Engelman-Loose and Bernd Gast (guitar) from Germany. The faculty concert featured Stella Castellucci, highly respected for her elegant use of jazz harmonies, and Sarah Voynow, winner of the 1991 Harpfest pedal harp competition, performing contemporary rock with her rhythm and blues band. Thursday evening's concerts highlighted a harp and guitar jazz duo from Italy, Licia Consoli and Giuseppe Leopizzi, as well as the contemporary original compositions of Laura Zaerr. The faculty presentation was a treat for the musical palate, featuring Kim Robertson and Deborah Henson-Conant, performing both as soloists and joining together for one selection

Under the leadership of Chapter President, Jan Jennings, the Central Florida Chapter of the American Harp Society is the winner of the 1995 Chapter of the Year Award. This award is presented each year to a chapter which has been nominated for its outstanding harprelated activities and contributions. The awards for Chapter of the Year and Honorable Mention were announced at the General Membership Meeting in Greeley, Colorado on 8 June 1995. Honorable Mention was given to the Lyra Chapter of Kansas City, Missouri, Jennifer Liebnitz, Chapter President.

The Central Florida Chapter is an extremely active chapter of only fifteen dedicated members. The members organized and presented a five-day Florida Summer Harp Seminar, which included workshops and presentations given by well-known harpists and craftsmen from throughout the country. A competition was held during the seminar for which two new compositions were commissioned. On a consecutive five nights, harp

concerts were presented and open to the public, exposing a number of individuals to live harp music for the first time through supplemental media coverage on television and local radio stations. Jan Jennings even took her instrument to a radio station and engaged in a "Name that Tune" game with the radio audience, along with providing a "harp request line." Funding for the seminar came from chapter members' successful efforts in acquiring donations and grants from local merchants, including a \$3,000.00 grant from the local Target department store.

Chapter members who were particularly instrumental in insuring the success of all chapter activities were Frank Sledge, Ruth Hauser, Elizabeth Evans and Jan Jennings.

By sponsoring an evening of Caribbean and jazz music led by Michael O'Shiver, chapter members were able to present the AHS with a generous check for the National Harp Competition Awards in memory of Lyra Chapter founder, Margaret Ling. Additional monies were also available to support the first Lyra Chapter-sponsored harp competition and evaluation program in Kansas City.

A week-long Festival of the Harp was organized and presented by chapter members, which involved performances and demonstrations, and concluded with a concert and a master class given by Carrol McLaughlin. Funding for the Festival was made possible by members of the chapter who performed for local businesses and gave demonstrations in exchange for needed support and services.

During the last two years, it has been the Lyra Chapter's mission to offer activities that benefit the newest players, rewarding their efforts and progress. Moreover, the chapter has made a concerted effort to make their organization a stage for not only the professional pedal harpists, but also for the folk harpers and student harpists. Their considerable efforts have paid off; in the

past year chapter membership rose from about fifteen members to a laudable thirty-eight paid members.



the day before the competition). The level and quality of performance by the competitors was extremely high. Winners in the pedal competition were: First Place, Calvin Stokes, Jr. (Cleveland, OH); Second Place, Michael Walls (Jacksonville, FL); and Third Place, Evelyn Huber (Germany). The HARPFEST scheduled theory classes in the morning and a myriad of workshops in the afternoon on such topics as improvisation, making arrangements, reading a lead sheet, professionalism, Latin music, copyrights and the business side of music, computer software

Featuring alumni harpists from the University of Arizona, the first evening concert also included outstanding performances by Park Stickney and Liza Rey (performing with a jazz trio), and HARPFEST Director Carrol McLaughlin. That evening's concert marked the inaugural appearance in performance of a new Lyon & Healy Electric Harp that was donated to the University of Arizona by Jack Nebergall in memory of John Escosa. Also performing that evening was the University of Arizona's eleven-harp ensemble, HarpFusion. Included on the program was the premiere of HarpFusion's new music video, and the world premiere of CAGADouble-D C, written by Park Stickney for electric harp and harp ensemble. Friday evening's concert featured wonderful performances by three artists: Ray Pool (pedal and lever harps), Sylvia Woods (lever harp), and Susan Mazer (in a trio with winds and percussion). Hosted by Eleanor Fell, a special HARPFEST celebration was held Saturday evening to celebrate Jack Nebergall's contributions to the harp world. Many HARPFEST faculty members and close friends of Jack's honored him, and musical presentations were made by Penny Beavers and Ray Pool. Sunday evening's concert sparkled with the musical energies of Kim Robertson (lever harp), Stella Castellucci (electric harp), and Harvi Griffin (electric harp). MetroHarp, The American Harp Society's Chapter of the Year (1995–96)

The 1995–96 season for MetroHarp (the Metropolitan Chapter of New York) contained programs by harpists of national and international acclaim, which, combined with student opportunities, filled the calendar with something for everyone. Membership for the year totaled 114. Average attendance was approximately 80. Programs and events for the year included the following.

Emily Mitchell, international competition winner, recording artist, touring soloist and university faculty member, performed a solo concert for an audience of 85 at the season's first meeting, held in the loft apartment of MetroHarp Vice-President, Dr. Jasmin Cowin.

Lucien Thomson, life-long disciple of Marcel Grandjany, was assisted by harpists Sarah Bullen of The New York Philharmonic, Sally Foster, veteran of many Broadway show orchestras, and Susan Jolles, associate member of The Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and one of New York's busiest freelancers. The subject at hand was the teaching repertoire of Marcel Grandjany. A special listing of various publications by Mr. Grandjany was prepared for this meeting. Selections from each volume were announced and performed by the three guest harpists.

Jennifer Hoult, Concert Artist Designate of The American Harp Society, was presented in solo concert at The Greenwich House Music School. Ticket sales were dramatic for this event. MetroHarp member Dulcie Barlow is the national coordinator of the Concert Artist Program for the AHS.

The Music Education Auditions and Evaluations were presented in February and March. The National Administrator of the program for The American Harp Society is our local member Lucien Thomson. He

served as adjudicator for these two events, assisted by Sally Foster. Participants received certificates at the final meeting of the season.

The Golkin Education Awards were initiated by devoted members Diane and Dewey Golkin. American students from New York, New Jersey, and Kansas were joined by others from Greece, France, Russia, and Canada who qualified for this program by being either a resident or a full-time student in New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, or Rhode Island. (The success of the program has caused it to be extended to include students and residents of Pennsylvania for the current year.) A total of \$4,400 was distributed to eight finalists on 27 April.

The final meeting of the season was a presentation by Lucile Lawrence concerning her pedagogy as influenced by Carlos Salzedo, with whom she was closely associated. Joined by another cast of New York professionals including Nina Kellman, Sara Cutler, Beth Robinson, Ray Pool, and Cynthia Otis, and also assisted by Boston harpist Elizabeth Morse and eleven-year-old student Mary-Elizabeth Sutherland, Miss Lawrence led the audience through an afternoon of samples from publications bearing her name along with that of Salzedo.

The American Harp Society was founded in 1962. Marcel Grandjany was Chairman of the Founding Committee. Lucile Lawrence was the first President from 1962 until 1966. She was followed by Lucien Thomson during the years 1966–68. What an honor it was to have these personalities and their colleagues comprise such a large part of this year's program. This report of the 1995–96 season of MetroHarp is prepared with thanks to the many members who offered performances or financial support throughout the year.

Mr. Pool was the President of the Chapter during this outstanding year. —Ed.


In January, Lucile Lawrence came and gave a master class at Chatham College. A special highlight of the day was a celebration in honor of Miss Lawrence's 90th birthday.

Music Education Auditions continue to be a high priority event for our chapter since its inception. This is an opportunity for harpists of any age or ability to perform before two musicians (non-harpists) and receive feedback on what the musician is hearing with suggestions for improvement. The harpists come back in six weeks with the music memorized and again receive feedback. Both sessions are recorded. Music theory tests are administered, both written and oral. Certificates are issued by the AHS and signed by Lucien Thomson. Many thanks go to Frances Miller, who sets up and coordinates the event; her husband, Grieg Aspnes, who does all the recording; Gaylord Stauffer, who makes out the schedules; and Betty Dahlgren, who keeps all the harps in tune. They have been the mainstays of this valuable annual event.

AHS CHAPTER OF THE YEAR 1998–1999 DALLAS CHAPTER

The 1998–99 year was an outstanding one for the Dallas Chapter of the American Harp Society. We increased membership from around 70 to over 100, sponsored our first ever harp competition, brought in Alice Chalifoux for a master class, had a special program exploring the harps and music of Asia, offered a seminar on harp-related injuries, gave students several opportunities to perform in public and had two wonderful recitals by area ensembles.

To start the year on the right note, our September meeting featured a recital by Syrinx, with Laura Logan, harp and Kelly Bolam Shea, flute. They performed Andante in C, K. 315 by Mozart, Sonata by Damase, Idylle and Allegretto, Op. 116 by Godard and Suite Antique by Rutter. It was a truly memorable performance with exquisite playing by both women.

In November Dr. Caryl Semmler presented a seminar on harp related injuries, based in part on her survey which many of us took in January 1997, with the results published in the March 1998 issue of *Medical Problems Of Performing Artists*, Vol. 13, No. 1. It was quite interesting to learn that almost all harpists suffer from aches and pains brought on by playing the instrument. Suggestions were made for ways to alleviate some of our problems, although old habits die hard.

Back by popular demand was our Thanksgiving Festival Concert, organized by Nancy Hurrell and featuring the students of Patricia Diers, Denise Holland, Sydney Howell, Nancy Hurrell and Jill Levy. It is truly an amazing sight to see forty harpists performing on harps ranging in size from lap harps to troubadours to full-sized pedal harps. The students first performed in

individual studio ensembles, then in a spectacular grand finale with everyone. It was certainly one of our most enjoyable programs and very beneficial for all who participated.

The ever-popular AHS Auditions and Evaluations, organized by Denise Holland, were conducted in late January, with the second installment one month later. This is always such a wonderful opportunity for students to get valuable input from a music professional other than their teacher, and is designed to encourage and inspire students of all ages and experience. Each participant receives a Certificate of Participation from AHS upon completion of both installments. (President's Note: I took part in this so long ago that my certificate was signed by Marcel Grandjany!)

In March, Eva Murphy presented an incredible program on the instruments and music of Asia. While performing as a harpist at the Palace Hotel in Tokyo, Japan, Eva scoured area flea markets for instruments. She also studied the koto. In her presentation she demonstrated how to play the koto and talked about all her unusual harps and other instruments. She also showed several videos explaining traditional koto playing, Japanese opera and theater, and other Japanese instruments. It was quite an education for those in attendance, for Eva not only taught us about the music, but the culture as well.

Also in March, we were privileged to have Alice Chalifoux present a seminar on *Success in Teaching the Harp.* Topics included recommended books and strengthening exercises, making practice time count, and overcoming technique problems and weaknesses. It was

attended by harpists from throughout the region. The seminar was professionally recorded and is available for purchase from the Dallas Chapter.

Our first harp scholarship competition was held on April 17, 1999. It was a great success! All twelve students who auditioned played very well. Advanced Level Winners Mary-Margaret Buchanan and Jasmin Jawad and Intermediate Level Winner Karen Abrahamson were especially impressive. The competition was open to students between the ages of 12 to 18 who were members of the Dallas Chapter of AHS. Required repertoire for the Intermediate Level (Troubadour or Pedal Harp) was Ground in F by Purcell/Thomson, Petite Etude by Van Veachton Rogers or Trois Pièces Faciles by Grandjany and a free choice. The requirements for the Advanced Level (Pedal Harp) were Chanson dans la nuit by Salzedo, Solfeggietto by C.P.E. Bach/Miller and a free choice. Each student played one required piece and a free choice from memory. Judges were Edna McClintock, local harpist and teacher, and Hector Guzman, conductor of the Plano Symphony. Laurel McConkey, organizer of the competition, made sure that the event ran smoothly. Awards were \$150 for Intermediate Level and \$250 for Advanced Level. Because both Mary-Margaret and Jasmin were so outstanding at the Advanced Level, it was decided to create an honorable mention award for Jasmin, with a \$100 prize. Each student that competed received a copy of the judges' notes and a Certificate of Participation. The competition was so successful that it will be repeated in the future.

"Octavia," our local professional harp ensemble, performed in April at the Dallas Public Library as part of the Mu Phi Epsilon Sunday Concert Series. This popular group consists of Laura Logan, director, and Jill Roberts Levy, Alison Read, Barbara Kirchhoff, Leslie Bluhm, Sydney Payne Howell, Naoko Nakamura Stromberg and Becky Scherschell. They performed unique arrangements of familiar ensemble works, as well as selections not often heard. The Dallas Chapter tries to participate each year in the Sunday Concert Series, since it is such a great opportunity to present harp music to the public.






els, but the chapter didn't skip a beat.

ast June, the Philadelphia Chapter was awarded Chapter of the Year by AHS President William Lovelace in recognition of our "Outstanding Contributions to the harp and its community." The year 2003-2004 was a busy one for us. In addition to the 2004 Conference committee's ongoing work, the Chapter hosted several events, including two in October 2003. The first was an afternoon conversation with Lucile Lawrence. Several young harpists played, and we had a chance to see and hear a legend practice her art. Particularly moving was a video that Dewey Owens brought featuring Miss Lawrence performing on TV in 1953 at the height of her art. Our second October event was a magnificent concert by Erica Goodman and Trio Lyra. Their long relationship as friends and colleagues was evident in their virtuosic ensemble.

In January, we held a Student Concerto
Competition. Twenty-six students competed for the
right to perform with the Philadelphia Young Artist
Orchestra at the 2004 Conference, often competing on
more than one work. The difficult job of selecting the
winners was ably made by judges Linda Wood Rollo,
Bob Capanna and Heidi Lehwalder. The day after the
competition, Linda Wood Rollo gave a masterclass for
intermediate level harpists, which was truly inspiring to
both the students and the audience. Kristie Withers,
AHS Concert Artist, was our guest in April. The audience was thrilled to hear this poised and accomplished
young harpist in a superb recital.

In addition to our meetings and ongoing semiannual newsletter, the Philadelphia Chapter has been active with fundraising projects. The *Harp Ornaments* Christmas CD project was created by the chapter as a way to fund special events for the 36th National Conference. Twelve harpists contributed their talents to create the sixteen tracks on the CD, with Kim Rowe donating her artistic skills to create the graph-

ics. Carol Thompson used her legal expertise to secure the required mechanical licenses. Projects funded by the CD included three new works commissioned by the Chapter for the 2004 Conference: James Primosch's Five New Sacred Songs, Kevin Kaska's Knights of the Red Branch, and Murray Boren's Lexicon. The historical re-enactors seen throughout the conference, the Fralinger Mummer String Band quartet at Saturday's "Philadelphia Meal," the choreographer and dancers for the performance of Bolmimerie, and the lapel pins given to conference attendees were all underwritten by this project. Funds from the CD also allowed us to start further fundraising projects, including the "Ben Franklin" shirts and Byer's Choice commemorative figurines seen at the conference. In addition, a donation of one dollar for each CD sold has been made to the Salvation Army.

In conjunction with its planning and preparations for the 2004 National Conference, the Chapter applied for and was awarded two grants. The first was from the Philadelphia Music Project to subsidize in part the commission of a work by James Primosch, composer at the University of Pennsylvania, to be premiered by the Jubal Trio at the conference. The second was from the Philadelphia Cultural Alliance, which underwrote the majority of the cost of having the Jubal Trio perform this work. Chapter members Carol Thompson and Helen Henry spent many hours preparing and submit-

ting these applications.

Working with the family of the late Edna Phillips, we were able to locate several of the manuscripts for some of the more than twenty works commissioned by Ms. Phillips with her husband, Samuel Rosenbaum, making it possible for several of these works to be performed at the 2004 AHS National Conference. Through the efforts of the chapter, Ms. Phillip's children, Joan Solaun and David Hugh Rosenbaum both made generous contributions to help defray the expense of performing some of these commissions at the conference.

Our mission is to continue the great tradition begun by Carlos Salzedo at the Curtis Institute, and continued by Edna Phillips, Marilyn Costello and many others. With over 175 members, the Philadelphia Chapter is excited to be able to encourage local students, bring quality performances, new repertoire, and a new awareness of the harp to the greater Philadelphia area. We feel honored and privileged to have our efforts recognized by being named Chapter of the Year by the American Harp Society.

A new chapter, only one year old, was also recog-



Mile High Chapter: Denver, Colorado



The New Orleans Chapter: Two Years after Hurricane Katrina by Patrice Fisher, former New Orleans Chapter President

When the summer comes in New Orleans and things slow down to a swamp pace, it is natural to reflect on how things have gone in the past year. This is especially significant for me, living in New Orleans, two years after Hurricane Katrina. There have been profound changes for many of us, since August 29, 2005. It has been one of the most difficult times of my life. But now I can find more reasons to hope than to despair.

Here are some of the things our New Orleans Chapter of the American Harp Society has done for our community since Hurricane Katrina:

- 1. We have collected and given away five lever harps, donated by Camac Harps of France.
- 2. We have collected \$13,429 in donations and paid out \$9,950 in artist fees to twenty-seven Louisiana and Gulf Coast harpists.
- 3. We have collected and given away 598 music books.
- 4. We have given out thirty-seven gift certificates, totaling \$3,250, to Louisiana and Gulf Coast harpists to replace harp supplies and music.
- We have produced twenty-two harp ensemble concerts throughout our region, employing twenty-seven Louisiana and Gulf Coast harpists.
- 6. We have collected and given away 501 harp strings.
- 7. We have collected and given away many boxes of clothes and harp supplies, such as harp carts, tuning keys, key holders, tapes, and CDs.
- 8. We have given out \$1,350 in grants to harp students to help them pay their harp rental fees.
- To commemorate our struggles this past year, we have commissioned and performed a new composition for harp, Merci, by Nancy Burtchaell.

- 10. We felt almost normal, when we were able to sponsor a master class by visiting harpist, Ann Yeung, at Tulane University, in New Orleans, in October 2006, and a concert by visiting harpist, Kimberly Hauser, in March 2007.
- 11. Our new President, Catherine Anderson, presented a much-needed master class for us on harp maintenance and repair.
- 12. I am using the Camac lever harp that was donated to me to teach a free harp class at St. Anna's Church for low income students.

Things have not gotten better as quickly as we hoped. We measure our progress in small increments. The day I took my first hot shower at home in more than a year was a great day for me. The amount of work that I have as a harpist has not yet returned to normal, but I have reached a "new normal," where relationships are more important to me than the number of jobs that I have. Ironically, I have more students than ever before. The harpists in our community have bonded in a way that I have not seen before in my thirty-two-year career as a professional harpist.

I have always believed more in community than in competition. I think we have excelled this past year in improving our community in ways that we have never before attempted. When people ask me, "How are things going in New Orleans?," I can now tell them, "You don't have to worry about us so much. We have turned the corner. We are going to be okay."
