
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Welcome to the 44TH NATIONAL CONFERENCE of the AMERICAN HARP SOCIETY

ANNE ADAMS AWARDS 2022 GRAND FINALISTS

In 1990 as a tribute to his wife, Anne Adams, Dr. Burton Adams founded the Anne Adams Fund to be administered by the American Harp Society as a successor to the discontinued University of Oregon Close Awards, embodying a similar mission of helping the development of future professional harpists. In 1991, Lyon & Healy joined this project and became a proud, integral sponsor of these Awards by offering a gift certificate and plaque in honor of the winners to be displayed in their showroom. At this same time Sally Maxwell, long-time supporter and organizer of the Anne Adams Awards, worked with Dr. Adams to establish that the Doris Calkins Fund could be earmarked to support the Anne Adams Awards. When Sally Maxwell passed away, her family and friends changed the name of the Doris Calkins Fund to the Sally Maxwell/Doris Calkins Fund which led to increased funding. Jack Nebergall joined the mission and bequeathed funds in support of these awards via the Jack/Doris Nebergall Fund. In honor of Anne Adams, these awards have always included an orchestra, ballet, or opera excerpt in addition to the required solo repertoire.

Three scholarship awards of \$3,000 each for full-time study of the harp are given to the three winners, thanks to the generous support from the Anne Adams Fund, The Sally Maxwell/Doris Calkins Fund, and the Jack/Doris Nebergall Funds.

GRANDJANY MEMORIAL COMPETITION 2022 GRAND FINALISTS

Madeline Arney, student of Gillian Benet Sella, University of Cincinnati-College Conservatory of Music Natalie Man, student of Marguerite Lynn Williams, Chicago College of Performing Arts, Roosevelt University

The Grandjany Memorial Competition has one winner, who receives an award of \$3,500. This competition was established in 1979 by the American Harp Society and was funded by Bernard Grandjany in honor of his father Marcel Grandjany and was enhanced by bequests from Mary Wheeler and Hermine Herbring.

French-born American harpist and composer Marcel Grandjany (1891–1975) helped create the American Harp Society, which he organized with a Founding Committee that met for the first time in 1962 at his New York apartment. To this day the American Harp Society has had a profound influence on the shaping of young harpists and the promotion of the harp as a serious musical instrument. Maestro Grandjany began his harp studies at age eight with Henriette Renié and at age eleven was admitted to the Conservatoire de Paris, where he studied with Alphonse Hasselmans and won the coveted Premier Prix at age thirteen. He appeared as soloist with major orchestras under the direction of Gabriel Pierné, Alfred Cortot, Walter Damrosch, Serge Koussevitzky, George Szell, Fritz Reiner and Vladimir Golschmann and a soloist with such luminaries as Maurice Ravel. Marcel Grandjany organized the harp department of the Conservatoire de musique et d'art dramatique à Montréal, and was head of the Harp Department at both the Juilliard School and the Manhattan School of Music. His lauded students included harpists Anne Adams, Nancy Allen, Kathleen Bride, Sarah Bullen, Catherine Gotthoffe, Ruth Inglefield, Karen Lindquist, Eileen Malone, Emily L. Oppenheimer, and Gretchen Van Hoesen, among many others.

INSTRUMENT SECURITY

Conference registrants are welcome to keep personal harps in their hotel rooms, where practicing is allowed within reasonable hours. The Harp Pen is available for storage of Conference performer/presenter instruments in the Washington Pavilion Green Room. The Harp Pen will be secure, monitored and/or locked 24 hours a day.

Harp owners loaning instruments to the Conference must sign a liability release form and receive a registration tag for each harp. Neither AHS nor the Conference venues provides insurance for any harps, and are not liable for damages that may occur while at the Conference. Harps will be registered, labeled, and moved to the Harp Pen by their owner unless prior arrangements have been made with the Harp Pen Coordinator.

Instruments of participants in the Diamond Celebration Harp ensembles may be secured in the Schulte Room for the week. Owners are responsible for moving their own instruments (see below).


NO RECORDINGS

The State of South Dakota prohibits smoking or use of electronic cigarettes (vaping products) in any public place or place of employment.






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ALETHEIA DUO
